We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2014-2015 educational progress for Lakeview Elementary School. Based on data in the AER report, the key challenges for Lakeview Elementary School include addressing weaknesses in writing and math in our economically disadvantaged population. The key initiatives to addressing needs this year are continuing the implementation of Multi-tiered System of Support that will address the gaps between learners in all grade levels (in the content of math and literacy), utilizing a writing coach to support effective instructional and assessment practices in the classroom that are rigorous as well as aligned, and implementing Evidence Based Literacy Instruction (EBLI) in all classrooms (K-3).

1. **PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL**

Lakeview Elementary serves as the lone elementary school housing preschool through third grade students. All kindergarten through third grade students within the district of Lakeview Community Schools are assigned to our school. However, the process for preschool enrollment is different. Lakeview Community Schools is part of the Montcalm Area Intermediate School District Preschool Consortium that offers preschool to eligible three to five year old children. The Lakeview Elementary Preschool follows the guidelines of Great Start Readiness Preschool.

Lakeview Elementary School Improvement Plan, as well as the Professional Development Plan are created in conjunction with each other to compliment the improvement of our school. A school excellence team is represented by all stakeholders of our school community. In the 2014-2015 school year, we used the Advanc-Ed website to update our school improvement plan via the template. For the 2015-2016 school year, we have utilized the ASSIST website provided by the state to compose and update our school improvement plan.

There is no content variance from the state model; however school staff has clarified the core curriculum to ensure understanding amongst the staff and stakeholders.
